Educate for life

Dear Parent/carer,

As the end of term approaches, we wanted to thank you for your support throughout this year. <u>Uniform</u>

In response to student and parent voice we have reviewed our uniform expectations throughout this academic year ahead of September. Thank you to all those focus groups who gave feedback.

We are keen for the school ethos to be based on positive conversations about learning. We know that a uniform provides equality between students regardless of background and culture however clothing expectations in the workplace have shifted significantly since Covid and it seems reasonable for schools to reflect this in some way. Research tells us that how the uniform is worn has no direct influence on educational achievement but we look to retain a uniform for the equality it provides the student community.

Therefore we are making the following changes to how the uniform is worn from September 2024. We anticipate this will strengthen relationships with all stakeholders whilst keeping the focus on educating for life and giving clarity of expectation. We want to maintain a positive culture and look to have more conversations about learning than uniform. Thank you to all students and parents for their feedback on this important matter.

Blazers: Blazers can be worn or carried. This removes the expectation to wear blazers in the corridors and classrooms. Students must carry their blazer to demonstrate they have it with them as they will be expected to wear it on certain specific occasions and it is important that every student has one CEC crested item of uniform for safeguarding purposes both on and off site. We are also aware some students like to wear their blazer to store belongings.

Skirts: Skirts must be worn to the knee unless worn with plain black tights or plain black leggings worn underneath the skirt.

Ties: Ties will now become optional for staff and students.

Other expectations remain as before. This includes all shirts and blouses being tucked in and natural look makeup. For more details see the school website.

<u>Phones</u>

In light of the Department for Education updated guidance on mobile phones we are consulting parents on their opinions of young people and mobile phones.

According to the DfE "Every school has a duty to create an environment that is calm, safe and free from distraction so all pupils, whatever their background, can learn and thrive. One of the greatest challenges facing schools is the presence of mobile phones. Today, by the age of 12, 97% of pupils own a mobile phone. Mobile phones risk unnecessary distraction, disruption and diversion. Nationally one in three secondary school pupils report that mobile phones are used in most lessons without permission. This not only distracts the pupil using the phone, but disrupts the lesson for a whole class, and diverts teachers' efforts away from learning."
